

A cosy residential neighborhood with a generous dose of charm, Hung Hom is a perfect microcosm of the city and just a stone's throw from Kerry Hotel.

This cafe serves up classic local westmeets-east favourites. A great pick for breakfast, where you'll be served HKstyle macaroni and the famous local iced milk tea.

Kwun Yam Temple

Built in 1873 by the neighbourhood residents, this temple is dedicated to the Goddess of Mercy and is the largest of its kind in Kowloon. The historic structure is now classified as a Grade I historic building in Hong Kong, and protected many during the second world war, as a shelter.

15 Station Lane

Jockey Club Innovation Tower

Designed by Zaha Hadid, this futuristic building is part of the Hong Kong Polytechnic University campus and home to its School of Design. Apart from classrooms and studios, the building also has a communal viewing lounge and exhibition spaces for regular designrelated events and showcases.



Lux Theatre

One of the last remaining vintage cinemas in Hong Kong, Lux Theatre first opened in 1971 and to this day still uses pen and paper to assign seats! After undergoing a renovation in 1995, the cinema continues to be an attraction for its retro décor and budget ticket prices.

Did you know?

Apart from MTR, bus and taxi services, you can also take the ferry from the Hung Hom Ferry Pier right outside the hotel! There are two ferry services that take passengers to and from North Point and Central, departing every 30 minutes!

Where are your favourite spots for photographing Hung Hom?

The Kerry Hotel has some incredible views of Victoria Harbour and Hong Kong island. However, for those wanting to snap some shots of the local neighbourhood, we would suggest heading out to the Hung Hom market where you will see the fresh produce of Hong Kong colourfully displayed.


The Whampoa MTR station is a 5-minute walk from the hotel, and you'll find a number of great local shops and eateries on the way. The promenade right on the doorstep is another great way of getting to TST with a fantastic picturesque view of the water en route!

What's the quickest way to get to, around, and out of Hung Hom?

The MTR from Whampoa is the closest station to the hotel and very quick and inexpensive to travel on. We also have the ferry pier moments from the hotel for quick and easy access to HK island with an 8-minute ferry across the harbour to North Point. The Central-Hung Hom ferry service now operates between Hung Hom (South) Ferry Pier and Central Pier No 8 (Western Berth) and takes around 18-minutes each way.

By the end of 2020, quests will be able to take advantage the "water taxi" ferry service, offering five stops in its main route, including Kai Tak Runway Park Pier Landing, Hung Hom (South) Ferry Pier, Tsim Sha Tsui Landing, Central Pier, and marine landing facilities at the southern waterfront of West Kowloon Cultural District. There will be one sail departure from Kai Tak at 7:00 pm daily to allow passengers to enjoy the night view of Victoria Harbour. The whole journey is around 110 minutes and the "water taxi" ferry service includes Wi-Fi, charging and food and beverage service as well as photo shooting service on board.

What's the most popular venue for Kerry Hotel quests?

- The must-go venue at the hotel is Red Sugar for its panoramic views of the city.
- The spa is an intimate destination, perfect for city dwellers and hotel residents.
- The hotel is also attached to a promenade that is popular for strolls in the cooler months.





Hong Kong has plenty of hiking trails, which ones are the most frequently visited among Kerry Hotel quests?

• Sunset peak – it offers the best natural evening views. It has an altitude of 869m and includes a 2 km uphill climb. You will be truly impressed with the beautiful scenery once you've reached the top.

Known as one of Hong Kong's best urban hikes, the Dragon's Back hiking trail rewards you with scenic views along the way, and when you look back once you've reached the end of the trail, you'll understand how Dragon's Back got its name.

Where are the best local spots for dim sum?

- With the hotel located in a predominantly residential area, the offerings are generous. From the affordable and cheerful Dragon Court across the road to Crystal Harbour Restaurant on Hung Lok Road to the more upmarket Nine Seafood Place at Whampoa Garden, there is an abundance of choice in the nearby area.
- For an even more unique dim sum experience, head over to Hung Tong located on level 7 of the hotel. The dim sums on the menu are just like small morsels of edible art.

Tai Ping Koon is the inventor of "soy sauce western" — or a Hong Kong style of western cuisine. Their famous "Swiss" sauce dishes are so-called due to a mis-pronunciation of "Sweet" by a former waiter who misheard a foreign customer! The staff here are all decade-long veterans and great at conversation.

Did you know?

Want to go alfresco? Dai Pai Dongs (literally "Big License Stalls", due to the appearance of licenses issued by the government to these stalls back in the day) in HK are clustered around the western end of Stanley Street. Known for their boisterous outdoor kitchens and sizzling-hot wok-fried dishes, dai pai dongs are a great way to enjoy some delicious Cantonese dishes like beef with oyster sauce and salt and pepper squid



Luk Yu Teahouse

The dark wood furnishings, swishing ceiling fans, and Chinese paintings on the walls all add a timeless touch to the classic dim sum served at this teahouse. Founded in 1933, it's one of the oldest in Hong Kong!

Drop in at night to try one of the restaurants and bars, like The Chinese Library or Dragonfly.


